

Longer biography

Kathleen Daly is Professor of Criminology and Criminal Justice, Griffith University (Brisbane).

Originally from the United States, she received her PhD in sociology from the University of Massachusetts-Amherst in 1983. She was Visiting Assistant Professor at the State University of New York at Albany in 1982-83; Assistant Professor (1983-88) and Associate Professor (1988-92) at Yale University; and Visiting Associate Professor (1992-95) at the University of Michigan-Ann Arbor. In 1995, she was awarded a Senior Fulbright Scholarship to work with John Braithwaite at the Australian National University (ANU). She was based in the ANU's Law Program in the Research School of Social Sciences from September 1995 through May 1996 before taking up her current position at Griffith University in June 1996.

She came to Australia to conduct research on restorative justice. Her Fulbright year research laid the foundation for the design of the South Australia Juvenile Justice (SAJJ) Research on Conferencing Project, funded by the Australian Research Council (ARC) (1998-99). The SAJJ group observed 89 conferences, surveyed the police and coordinators present at those conferences, and interviewed the conference offenders and victims in 1998, and again, in 1999. She received a second major ARC grant to direct a program of research on the race and gender politics of "new justice" practices (conferences and Indigenous sentencing courts) in Australia and New Zealand (2001-03). The project has several components: an archival study of sexual assault cases disposed of by caution, conference, and court in South Australia, 1995-2001; ethnographic research on white-Indigenous justice relations in South Australia and Queensland; and interview studies of victim groups' and Indigenous and non-Indigenous women's views on criminal justice and restorative justice responses to sexual assault and family/domestic violence. She received a third major ARC grant (2004-06) to continue the research on Indigenous justice practices and to extend the program of research in Australia and New Zealand to Canada. In 2008, Professor Daly launched an international research project on innovative responses to sexual violence, which is funded by the ARC (2008-2011). This project synthesises knowledge and gathers new data on conventional and innovative justice responses to sexual violence in countries in the global north and south. In 2009, as co-PI with Elena Marchetti and Jackie Huggins, Daly began collaborating on a project on optimal approaches to sentencing Indigenous partner violence, funded by the ARC (2009-2013).

Subjects she has taught recently include innovative justice; race, crime, and justice; qualitative social research; sociological theories of crime and justice; and contemporary debates in criminology. She received two Teaching Commendations for Excellence in the Supervision of Honours and Postgraduate Coursework, and Higher Degree Research Students from Griffith University (2002).

Professor Daly has authored (or co-authored) two books, four edited collections, seven major reports, and over 75 articles in journals, edited collections, and law reviews. She has written on sentencing, prostitution, media and crime, feminist and anti-racist challenges to criminology, domestic and sexual violence, women and gender in crime and the criminal justice system, and most recently, restorative justice

and Indigenous justice. She published an edited collection (with Lisa Maher), *Criminology at the Crossroads: Feminist Readings in Crime and Justice* (1998) and is editor of *Crime and Justice: A Guide to Criminology* (2006) (with Andrew Goldsmith and Mark Israel of Flinders University), a significant introductory level text in criminology. She received the Michael J. Hindelang award in 1995 from the American Society of Criminology for her book, *Gender, Crime and, Punishment* (Yale University Press 1994), and the Distinguished Scholar Award from the Division of Women and Crime, American Society of Criminology (1994). From 2005 to 2009, she was President of the Australian and New Zealand Society of Criminology (ANZSOC), and was Program Chair and Co-Convenor for the 2002 and 1997 Annual Meetings of the ANZSOC in Brisbane. In 2007, she was elected Fellow of the Academy of the Social Sciences in Australia.

She is currently on the editorial boards of *British Journal of Criminology*, *Theoretical Criminology*, *Punishment & Society*, *Feminist Criminology*, *Australian & New Zealand Journal of Criminology*, *Critical Criminology*, *Studi Sulla Questione Criminale*, *Journal of Theoretical and Philosophical Criminology*.

Since 1998, she has given plenary addresses and public lectures on restorative justice in Australia, New Zealand, Canada, the United States, Germany, England and Wales, Scotland, and Portugal. In 2004, she was a Visiting Fellow at the Institute of Criminology, University of Cambridge (September-December), and is a Fellow of Clare Hall, University of Cambridge.
