COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course further develops students' proficiency in Italian and understanding of contemporary Italian society and culture through the study of a selection of films produced in the period from 1945 to the present. The assessment consists of an oral presentation and written commentaries during semester and oral and written final examinations, with a small component awarded for participation in class.

RATIONALE AND OBJECTIVES

The course offers Italian language not only as an object of study in itself, but also as a means by which to study other things: Italian culture and society; debates and discourses transmitted through the language; and especially Italian cinema. It therefore draws on elements of a number of disciplines: film studies and textual analysis, history, sociology and linguistics.

The course aims to:

- develop communicative ability in all four macro-skills to the level where students are able to satisfy routine academic, social and personal needs in the Italian language;
- further skills in textual analysis;
- enhance students' understanding of contemporary Italian society through investigation of the relationships between film production and contemporaneous cultural and political debates and events.

COURSE CONTENT

Four films are set for study in this course:

- *Il grande cocomero*, Francesca Archibugi, 1993.
- *Lamerica*, Gianni Amelio, 1994.
- *Roma città aperta*, Roberto Rossellini, 1945.
- *Rocco e i suoi fratelli*, Luchino Visconti, 1960.

Students will study a fifth film independently in preparation for the oral exam.

The films selected introduce students to two key directors of the 'new Italian cinema' of the 1980s and 1990s and to two great exponents of Italian neo-realism, Rossellini and Visconti. The films are not only masterpieces of cinema but provide a window on key periods and events in contemporary Italian history. *Roma città aperta* is set during the Resistance, *Rocco e i suoi fratelli* against the backdrop of the massive internal migrations associated with the economic miracle of the late 1950s. The Italy of the 1990s, depicted in *Il grande cocomero* and *Lamerica*, is a major economic power, its society reflecting a rapid process of modernization and secularization and the resulting contradictions. Although the directors and scriptwriters of three of the four films are men, all the films allow insight into the representations of women in Italian film and in Italian culture in general.

ORGANIZATION AND TEACHING METHOD

There are three contact hours per week, in seminar/workshop format. All class work is conducted in Italian.

The seminar time is organized around textual analysis of the films and exploration of their themes in relation to the context in which they were produced, as well as discussion of cinema conventions and key developments in the Italian film industry. During the first half of semester, each student is required to make an oral presentation on one week's topic, which constitutes the starting point for the seminar discussion that week.

The workshop time includes activities aimed at developing all four linguistic macro-skills (reading, writing, listening, speaking) and exploring grammatical structures, with particular attention to assisting students' comprehension of the dialogue of the films and the set readings in Italian. Some workshop time is regularly dedicated to providing feedback on students' writing in the continuous assessment tasks.

Students are required to view the films outside class. A regular weekly booking will be made of a LAN room in order to encourage students to watch them together. It is **essential** that all students have seen each film before the relevant discussion begins in class, that is: *Il grande cocomero* by week 2, *Lamerica* by week 4, *Roma città aperta* by week 8, *Rocco e i suoi fratelli* by week 11. Similarly, students are expected to read the set written material in Italian and/or English each week before attending class.

Students are encouraged to use the CWIC Italian corpus as a reference resource, especially when revising their written work. It is available on the Web at www.pragmasoft.com.au with a temporary password of *prova*. Anyone who is not familiar with this tool (having completed *Italian IIB: The Written Language* prior to 1998) should contact Claire to arrange a brief training session.

It is strongly recommended that students work regularly in self-access mode with the videodisc facility *Italia oggi*, located in LAN 1.11. Units of particular relevance to the course are: *La liberazione di Roma il 5 giugno 1944*, *La mitica 600*, *Il film 'Lamerica' di Gianni Amelio*, *Federico Fellini in mostra*, *Antonioni a Venezia*, *Un Oscar per Antonioni*, *La scomparsa di Massimo Troisi*, *Anna Galiena*, *Marcello Mastroianni nel film 'Sostiene Pereira'*, *Giuseppe Tornatore e 'Lo schermo a tre punte'*, *Gian Maria Volonté*. Early in semester, especially, the units on actors and directors are useful for becoming acquainted with film terminology.

Students are also encouraged to watch Italian programmes on SBS and Rai International and listen to those on SBS radio and 4EB, to participate in the activities of the students' club (GUCCI) and to take advantage of opportunities for contact with the Italian community in Brisbane through such organizations as the Dante Alighieri Society.

Continuous assessment

The continuous assessment item will consist of four written tasks, one related to each block. These are to be handed in at class in weeks 5, 8, 11 and 14 respectively. Each student’s best three marks will be taken into account in calculating the overall mark for this item.

Oral presentation

The oral presentations will be held in the first half of semester (weeks 2-7) and the topics are those listed in the weekly programme above. A presentation will be 10-15 minutes long and will provide the starting point for class discussion. Students will be required to select a topic (and therefore a date) for their presentation in week 1.

Participation

The mark awarded for participation will reflect students' attendance and contribution to class activities and discussion throughout semester. All students are expected to participate actively each week, demonstrating their understanding of both the films and the set readings.

Examinations

The written exam will consist of short commentaries in Italian on aspects of the four films studied. The oral exam will be in the form of an interview with the teaching team, in which students will discuss a film of their choice, other than those studied in class.

TEXTS AND SUPPORTING MATERIALS

As well as a good bilingual dictionary (eg *Concise Cambridge Italian Dictionary*, *Collins Sansoni Italian Dictionary*) students will need access to a monolingual dictionary such as *Dizionario Garzanti della lingua italiana* or *Il nuovo Zingarelli*.

The library holds *Dizionario Garzanti della lingua italiana*, *Lessico universale italiano* and *Enciclopedia italiana Treccani*.

The *Italia oggi* workstation is equipped with a reference library, including monolingual and bilingual dictionaries, grammar reference books, mini-encyclopedias and atlas. These books may be consulted at any time, but must not be removed from room LAN 1.11. Before entering the room, students are required to leave their ID card at Reception.
