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His association with the University began in December 1970 when he was appointed by the Queensland Government as one of the thirteen members of the Interim Council which was charged with the responsibility for developing a second university in Brisbane. He was elected Deputy Chancellor in 1975, a position he occupied until his election as Chancellor in 1985.

In his long and uninterrupted service on Council, Sir Allan worked indefatigably for the interests of the University. His

term as Chancellor coincided with a period of significant changes in Commonwealth Government policies on the funding of higher education and of expectations of priorities within institutions. Sir Allan's financial expertise guided Council in making a number of urgent and significant decisions, amongst them the decision to market the University's research skills and to make some of its programs available as full-fee paying programs to overseas students.

Sir Allan's official and unofficial contributions to the growth of Griffith, especially his financial and administrative acumen, were of inestimable value to the University during its formative years.





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
