It's here to help your teen start thinking about their future career—and, importantly, their pathway to it. You may also find value in it as a tool to help you best support your teen through this exciting time in their life.

Why should I go to uni?





Studying for a degree means more than just getting a fancy piece of paper at the end of it. It's your pathway to a lifelong journey doing what you love in a career that matters to you.

Although school and uni can seem pretty similar, trust us: your time at Griffith will be a whole new experience—and there are plenty of good reasons to make the jump.



Better job prospects

People with a university degree are more likely to be employed than those without. A lot of jobs also require specific non-school qualifications.



Higher earning potential

According to the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS), full-time workers with non-school qualifications (including undergraduate and postgraduate degrees) earn an average of almost \$1,000 a week more than those without.



Skills to last a lifetime

The world is changing—and so is the workforce. Uni degrees offer a range of valuable, transferable soft skills that will serve you well across a variety of industries and roles



A brighter future

To recap: the higher your level of education, the broader your skill set. And the broader your skill set, the better your progress in your chosen career—which you'll have a better chance of getting into because you went to uni.

How is uni different from school?



You'll get some variety in your week

Once you get to uni, gone are the days of all-day schooling every Monday to Friday. Here, you'll start and finish at different times every day—and some days, you may not even have to come in at all.



You pick your schedule

You'll be able to choose when you want to attend your lectures and tutorials from a range of available times and days. That means you can spread your studies out and take things easy across the week—or load things up over a couple of days to free up extra time to spend however you like!



Wait, lectures and what-nows?

Right, sorry—lectures are where you'll notice one of the greatest differences from school. They're usually non-interactive sessions where you cover all the requirements of each course (subject) alongside what is usually a large group of your peers. Think of them kind of like "big" lessons.

In tutorials—"small" lessons—you'll be encouraged to interact with other students and teachers in a more relaxed class size and setting. Here, you can ask questions, offer input, create teams for group projects and get help with your assessments.



You'll go beyond the classroom

Of course, you won't always be stuck at a desk. Depending on what you study, you may be able to get some hands-on work time in labs, design studios, workshops and out in the field. At Griffith, you'll also be guaranteed to get at least some work experience in your planned career area over the course of your degree and you may even get paid!



Your learning is in your hands

At uni, you'll take full control of your learning. You'll be responsible for managing your workload, doing your readings, staying on top of your study and getting your assessment in on time.

If that sounds like a bit much, don't stress—uni is heaps more flexible than high school. We run three trimesters every year (starting in March, July and November), so you have maximum choice over how you plan out your study workload. Go full time, part time, on campus, online, mix it up; whatever works for you!





Finding your path



Years 9 and 10 are a great time to start considering your interests and talents, and begin thinking about your career. It's OK to change your mind—a lot of people change careers throughout their lifetime.





Learn the lingo



You'll hear a lot of new terms get used when people speak about uni. Here are a few it may be handy to know.

Adjustment factors

Adjustment factors can help you get into your preferred degree by boosting your ATAR. We award a range of adjustment factors based on your individual circumstances as well as your results for certain subjects and uni courses completed in high school.

Assumed knowledge

Assumed knowledge is the minimum level of achievement in a senior subject considered necessary for success in the first year of your degree.

ATAR

An Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR) is the standard measure of overall school achievement used by all Australian states and territories, expressed on a scale from 99.95 (highest) down to 30.00.

Bachelor degree

Also known as an undergraduate degree, a bachelor degree is a qualification awarded for the first level of study undertaken at university, usually lasting three to four years full time.

Experience-based entry

Some degrees require applicants to attend an audition, interview and/or submit a folio of work. Specific information about these requirements is available at griffith.edu.au/degrees

Full time

If you are studying full time, you will finish your degree within the shortest time frame. An academic full-time load is eight courses or subjects each year in most degrees.

Grade point average

Your grade point average (GPA) represents your performance at university over a defined period—such as a trimester—on a scale of 1 to 7.

Major

A major is an area of specialised study within (and can be a formal requirement of) a degree.

Part time

Part-time study is defined as enrolment in less than 75 per cent of the standard full-time load.

Pathway

If you do not meet the entry requirements for your preferred degree, Griffith pathways can help you qualify for entry to a degree.

Prerequisite

A prerequisite is a senior subject that you must complete and achieve a specified result in before you are considered for entry.

Recommended study

Recommended study refers to senior subjects we recommend you study to help you understand content before starting your tertiary studies.

Trimester

Most universities have two semesters, but we have three trimesters at Griffith. If you study in the third trimester, you may be able to finish your degree and get into the world of work quicker.

Students must achieve a minimum grade of C in Units 3 and 4 to meet the English subject prerequisite.







Planning for a career in medicine

At Griffith, medicine is a graduate-entry, postgraduate degree. You can choose any degree but the following provide good foundational knowledge for a future in medicine:

- Bachelor of Medical Science (high-school leavers only)
- Bachelor of Biomedical Science
- Bachelor of Health Science
- Bachelor of Medical Laboratory Science
- Bachelor of Pharmacy
- Bachelor of Pharmacology and Toxicology
- Bachelor of Paramedicine

Depending on your degree, there are three criteria for the Doctor of Medicine:


- Completion of a bachelor degree, with a GPA of 5.0[^] or above on a 7-point scale calculated using the Graduate Entry Medical School Admissions System schema.
- Achieving a minimum score of 50 in each section of the Graduate Medical School Admission Test (GAMSAT*), and a minimum overall score of 50.
- 3. Performance in the Griffith University Multi Station Admissions Assessment (GUMSAA*).

Dentistry study pathways

On successful completion of the Bachelor of Dental Health Science and the Master of Dentistry, graduates will be qualified as a registered dentist. Further student training includes honours or postgraduate coursework and can lead to a career in specialty practice or academic teaching.







Guaranteed Admission

We offer a range of guaranteed admission schemes including the Year 12 Early Offer Guarantee, ATAR/Rank Guarantee, Griffith University Head Start Guarantee and the VET Guarantee for those who have completed an AQF Certificate III or above. Depending on your study choices, you may be eligible for guaranteed admission into one of a range of our undergraduate degrees.

Year 12 Early Offer Guarantee

To give you certainty about your future, we've developed a way for you to get an offer to study at Griffith before you receive your ATAR or IB diploma results.

We'll also make early offers to students who are completing a VET qualification in the year prior to starting uni or have successfully completed our Griffith Head Start program (see next page). Under this scheme, offers will be issued from September through November—so you can relax and enjoy your break before you start your next chapter at university.

ATAR/Rank Guarantee

We encourage high school students to achieve an ATAR. At Griffith, you'll be recognised for your performance in your studies with an assurance you'll be able to take your place in a range of our in-demand undergraduate degrees.

Under our ATAR/Rank Guarantee, we'll offer you a place in the degree of your choice provided you achieve its published ATAR/entry rank.

This guarantee applies up to the QTAC and UAC rounds in mid-January each year, or until your chosen degree is closed for further intake.

VET Guarantee

Griffith's VET Guarantee is an assurance that your Australian Qualifications Framework (AQF) Certificate III, IV or Diploma provides admission to a range of degrees.

If you have successfully completed one of these qualifications, you don't need to apply separately for this guarantee—just let us know in your QTAC or UAC application.

Griffith University Head Start program

Did you know you can study a course (subject) at Griffith, achieve your goals quicker and get study credit towards one of our degrees, all while you finish high school?

Designed for eligible Year 11 and 12 students looking to hit the ground running when they get to uni, Head Start will cover your tuition fees for your chosen course, so you can save money, as well as gain credit and be guaranteed entry into a wide range of Griffith degrees.

If you're a motivated student who is looking to learn from industry leaders and stretch your academic boundaries, consider applying for a Head Start course to attend on campus, at school or online.

You will learn through on-campus tutorials, workshops, lectures and group assignments. Your projects and classes will have you researching, investigating, critically analysing and writing effectively.

We have over 35 courses to choose from across subject areas including:

- business
- education
- health
- science
- · humanities and languages
- law and criminology
- visual and creative arts.

Head Start can be used to help secure guaranteed entry into one of more than 100 Griffith degrees, so you're bound to find a subject worth learning to take time and money off your time at uni. Eligible students can complete up to two courses while at school, and can commence from Term 2 of Year 11. To successfully complete a 10-credit point course, you'll need to attend about two to four hours of lectures and tutorials each week.

This commitment is required in addition to your school study load. So, we recommend speaking with your school and parents or quardians to ensure you can manage this workload!

Upon successfully completing Head Start and your Year 12 studies, you'll be eligible for an offer to study one of more than 100 single and double degrees across a range of areas.

You can also earn two (2.00) adjustments towards your ATAR when you apply to all eligible Griffith undergraduate degrees.

Don't forget—where you're eligible, you'll be able to get credit for the courses you've already done once you start your degree at Griffith.

How much credit you can get will depend on which Head Start course you've taken and what degree you're planning to study.

Adjustment factors

Our adjustment factors can help you get into your preferred degree by considering your circumstances as well as your academic results. You may be able to receive an adjustment to your ATAR or rank from secondary studies to improve your chances. The maximum total adjustments that you can receive under all pathways is eight (8.00) ranks.

Most adjustments are automatically taken into account when you apply to study at Griffith through QTAC or UAC. If you want to check your available adjustments, you can simply fill out your details on our handy online calculator and make your study choices with confidence. Year 12 Subject Adjustment

If you have successfully studied a subject in high school that requires a high level of skill or knowledge, you could receive an adjustment to your ATAR or rank from secondary studies of up to six (6.00) ranks (or 2.00 ranks a subject) under this pathway.

Gold Coast and Logan Priority Access

If you live in one of our eligible suburbs from the Greater Brisbane region to Nambucca Shire, NSW, and have never studied at university before, you may be eligible for Priority Access.

If you reside in one of the listed locations, you will be awarded an adjustment of two (2.00) ranks to your eligible Gold Coast and/or Logan campus preferences.

Brisbane Community Engagement

If you are new to tertiary study and a resident of the Brisbane, Logan, Ipswich or Redlands area, you may be eligible for two (2.00) adjustments for degrees at our Brisbane South (Nathan) or Brisbane City (South Bank) campuses.

Educational Access Scheme

If you've experienced difficult circumstances that have negatively impacted your studies, the Educational Access Scheme (EAS) can help you get into your preferred degree. If you're eligible, you may receive adjustments that improve your chances of getting an offer.

Elite Athlete Adjustment Factors

Our Elite Athlete Adjustment Factors acknowledge the value of integrating sporting and academic aspirations. As a recognised elite athlete–friendly university, we may consider the impact of your sporting commitments on your last two years of education and you may receive adjustments to eligible QTAC preferences.

Bachelor of Medical Science adjustments

For applicants to our highly competitive Bachelor of Medical Science, a range of incremental adjustments are available based on EAS, location and rurality.










Bridging courses and enabling programs

If you don't have the assumed knowledge or prerequisites expected for your desired degree, we strongly encourage you to undertake bridging courses or enabling programs in order to strengthen your foundation for study. Bridging courses can help you fill gaps in your existing knowledge and may also help you to meet subject prerequisites. Enabling programs can help you obtain the qualifications required for admission into your preferred degree.

EmpowerED University Preparation Program

This free program will help you experience university life while building your confidence and academic study skills. You'll be all set for success as you learn the essentials of critical reading, writing and referencing in our distinctively supportive environment. You'll work through four compulsory courses and two electives, each delivered in six-week blocks with two three-hour workshops each week.

On completing the program, you'll be granted guaranteed entry to your preferred Griffith degree in the next trimester (subject to entry requirements) as well as gaining credit towards your degree.

Undergraduate diplomas

Students interested in studying in one of our competitive health degrees specifically and whose ATAR/rank doesn't meet admission requirements may also be eligible for entry through our First Peoples Health Pathway.

Scholarships are a great way to help fund your study. Depending on your degree and your circumstances, you may be eligible for a scholarship that can provide direct financial support to make university more affordable.

A scholarship can help you cover a variety of costs, including tuition fees as well as education and living expenses. Scholarships are also a great way to access networking and mentorship experiences, as well as specific scholarship opportunities such as travel grants.

Hundreds of scholarships

We offer a wide range of scholarships, so our students can get the financial assistance they need.

We have scholarships for academic achievement, recognising high-achieving students with a variety of general and specific assistance, but also consider factors beyond your performance in your studies:

- Equity support—supporting students enduring financial hardship or educational disadvantage.
- First Peoples—opening doors for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students to thrive in their studies.
- Sporting achievement—helping our elite athletes to balance their sporting commitments and study load.
- Relocation within Australia—assisting students who need a place to live, including those who are relocating specifically to study at Griffith.

Some particular opportunities of note include:

- Vice Chancellor's Academic Achievement Scholarship for students with an ATAR of 95.45 or higher, allowing for an adjustment of up to 8.00 ranks applied based on Educational Disadvantage Assessment.
- Brighter Futures Scholarship—supporting students who demonstrate excellence despite facing adversity.
- Chancellor's Scholarship—supporting students who have experienced educational disadvantage, those from a rural or remote area, and those of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander background.

Tips and tools for helping your teen

Supporting your teen in thinking about their future can feel like a big task—but it doesn't have to be one. From starting conversations to exploring their interests and options together, your guidance can make a big difference to their life after school.

Start with the past

Kick things off with a chat about what your teen enjoys, what they're good at and what matters most to them.

- Stay positive—Talk about what makes your teen happy and shine a light on any unique strengths or interests they already have.
- Pick your moment—Choose a relaxed time to talk, like during a meal, a walk or car ride.

Look into the future

Use what you've learned about your teen's interests and values to explore where they see themselves in the future.

- Dream big—Ask your teen what career they'd go for if anything were possible: no limits and no worries about money or failure.
- Try new things—Help your teen discover new interests by visiting places like museums, going to community events or trying out volunteering.

Tips for setting goals

- Go large— Encourage your teen to dream without limits.
 Big ideas can lead to exciting opportunities.
- Ask why—Chat about why certain goals appeal to them and ask whether achieving those goals make them feel proud, happy and fulfilled.
- Break it down—Think about what sorts of practical steps they
 can take now, like picking certain school subjects, joining clubs
 or gaining experience through volunteering.
- Build resilience—Talk about how to handle setbacks or doubts as well as how to keep going if they feel discouraged or face disapproval from their friends or other family members.




