This timeline charts some of Craig Redman and Karl Maier's most iconic projects over the past three decades, from their first partnership Kar Red in their final years of university, through their work with Brisbane-based design and art group Rinzen, to collaborations delivered during their now three-decade history as Craig & Karl.

Included are commissions such as their portrait of Barack Obama for the cover of *New York Magazine* in November 2012; poster illustrations for the Bayerische Staatsoper (Bavarian State Opera) in 2013; branding and promotional displays for Berlin-based fashion trade show Bread & Butter in 2016; and a tiled mosaic for Target Times Square, New York City, in 2022.

The timeline also charts their more recent forays into public art and immersive environments, such as *Prismatic* in Sai Lau Kok Garden, Hong Kong; Mini Golf at Canary Wharf, London; and their 2025 takeover of Brisbane City Council's Outdoor Gallery, *Rear Vision*, curated by Griffith University Art Museum.

Interspersed within the documentation are simple experiments with pattern and colour that are immediately recognisable as Craig & Karl's bold and playful signature. These patterns convey humour, optimism and joy, enhancing Craig & Karl's constant themes of community, identity, imagination, and love.

This corner displays only a fraction of items from Craig Redman and Karl Maier's extensive archive of merchandise, publications, and brand collaborations, from their early forays as Kar Red, to design and art collective Rinzen, to more recent projects as Craig & Karl.

In addition to Craig & Karl–branded merchandise, highlights include capsule collections for fashion labels such as Adidas, Esprit, and Le Specs, and beauty brands such as Sephora; 'Darcel Disappoints', a plush toy character created by Redman that featured a collaborative furniture collection for IKEA in 2019; and even a concept design for Turkish Airlines!

Created especially for *Double Vision*, *Double Rainbow* 2025 is a symbolic reference to Redman and Maier's intertwined work style, while also epitomising the Craig & Karl ethos of enhancing public spaces and promoting active interaction.

Employing bright shapes with the simplest of elements, this cheery double rainbow welcomes us into the space, fostering community and shared experiences, bringing us optimism and joy.

Craig & Karl's portraits are one of their most highly recognised series. Beginning with those around the duo—such as friends, partners, and neighbourhood identities—the series has evolved into portrayals of inspirational figures drawn from art, music, politics, and sport.

These images are deceptively simple, with heavy black lines forming almost an identikit toolbox of facial features, but their skilfully garish colour combinations created using Ben Day dots or stripes mean we can often immediately recognise each subject. Specific hairstyles and accessories anchor the artworks in particular eras, but they are all subjected to the same artistic treatment.

This pair of works are particularly intimate to the artists. *Lean Towards This Time* is a portrait of Karl's partner Amee and *Never Even Scratched the Surface* depicts Craig's partner Thomas. Their titles are equally personal, taken from the lyrics of their favourite songs.

Together 1–4 2025 realise a concept that Craig & Karl have been experimenting with for several years. Continuing the duo's playful preoccupation with doubling, the series reimagines traditional loveseats or tête-à-têtes by employing their signature eight-colour palette in designs that mirror, invert, and remodel traditional chair structures.

War and Peace 2025

Some of the earliest works of art are handprints on the walls of caves. Some hand gestures transcend cultural boundaries, and others vary significantly across cultures. They highlight the close connection between the physical hand and the cognitive functions of the brain and symbolise a wide range of human experiences: power, tenderness, camaraderie, and conflict.

War and Peace has a cheeky double meaning: while a palmoutward 'V' (for victory or peace) is common in many places, if it's turned around with the palm facing inward, it's an insult in many countries, particularly across the Commonwealth.

At its core, *Double Vision* is a celebration of Craig Redman and Karl Maier's shared creative vision over almost 30 years, highlighted by design elements such as the two-faced entry wall, double rainbows, and seating that concertinas back in on itself.

In the exhibition's culminating room, Craig & Karl reimagine their signature inflatables to create a disorienting experience of watching and being watched, a tongue-in-cheek comment on the experience of working together, and the increasing global attention their work now receives.

Now and Then 2025

Craig & Karl recreate common phrases and sayings in their unique and humorous style to transcend communication barriers. This work cleverly plays on our point of view, offering different messages as you move around the space.

Created on a lenticular wall, *Now and Then* collapses linear time, folding two moments into one to suggest a point where time feels layered instead of straightforward, and history repeats. 'Now' suggests the immediate present, while 'Then' can refer to both the past and the future, as in 'we'll go then'.

Craig & Karl's vibrant inflatable sculptural characters, known as 'Mateys', are intended to transform and enliven public spaces.

These playful installations employ bold, geometric forms achieving remarkable expressiveness with the simplest of facial features.

By populating our outdoor campus environments with these endearing conversation starters, the artists have created a series of gathering points that celebrate a simple and unexpected delight in our everyday surroundings.

About the artists:

Craig Redman & Karl Maier first teamed up in 1999 after meeting as students at the Queensland College of Art & Design, Brisbane. They came to attention as co-founders of design collective Rinzen before establishing themselves as collaborative duo Craig & Karl in 2011. Their beginnings in Brisbane continue to inform their practice, regularly incorporating homages to the city that helped launch their careers. Their dynamic aesthetic employs the artists' signature message of humour, joy and optimism to explore themes of community, identity, imagination, and love. They have delivered projects for major clients such as Adidas, Tate London, New Yorker Magazine, Apple, Google, Nike, Vogue, Vanity Fair, Washington Post, New York Times, and Canary Wharf. Their work has been exhibited most notably at the Musée de la Publicité, Paris; the Onassis Cultural Centre, Athens; the Museum for Contemporary Art, Mexico; Museum of the Moving Image, New York; and K11 Foundation, Guangzhou, China.
