Tweed Climate Action Community Readiness Survey




Summary snapshot

Between November 2022 and January 2023, Griffith University surveyed residents of the Tweed Shire to understand perceptions and experiences with climate action, including greenhouse gas emissions and preparedness and adaptation strategies for climate events such as floods and bushfires.




252 residents of the Tweed completed the survey

What we're already doing for the environment




- 62% carry a reusable drink container
- 57% refuse to use non-biodegradable plastic products
- **58%** have signed a petition or written a letter on environmental issues
- 48% generate their own electricity (i.e. solar)
- 25% purchase energy through green power supplier

What we're not doing



- 88% have not used public transport due to lack of opportunity or other reasons
- 55% don't turn off appliances at the wall due to convenience or time reasons
- 53% are eating a high carbon diet

Barriers to taking environmental actions



- 31% don't believe actions will stop or solve environmental problems
- 30% don't trust authorities supplying information about environmental issues
- 22% actions are too expensive

Most supported potential government environmental initiatives



Work with landholders to strengthen ecosystem health and wildlife diversity.



Prioritise ecosystem-based adaptation strategies such as tree planting.



Strengthen construction and building sustainability requirements.
