4.0 DURATION OF PRIZE

4.1 The prize is to be offered on an annual basis

5.0 ELIGIBILITY FOR PRIZE

- 5.1 Awarded to a Queensland Conservatorium Griffith University classical piano student for the purpose of undertaking postgraduate studies in pianoforte at the Conservatorium or an approved overseas institution.
- 5.2 Previous winners of this prize are ineligible to enter

6.0 SELECTION PROCESS

- 6.1 All competitors are required to play for between 25-40 minutes duration including 5 minutes for the set piece and the programme must include a work or works from each of the following categories:
 - a. Bach, Mozart, Haydn, Scarlatti, Handel, Couperin:
 - b. Beethoven, Brahms, Chopin, Schumann, Schubert, Franck:
 - c. A virtuoso piece from the Romantic, Modern or Contemporary repertoire:
 - d. A set piece (5 minutes)
- 6.2 In any year when there are no entries of a sufficiently high standard, no prize shall be awarded
- 6.3 The competition will be judged by a panel of three judges, such judges being appointed by the Chair of Non-Orchestral Instruments or their nominee in this discipline. No judge shall be the teacher of a student who is competing.

7.0 ADMINISTRATION OF THE PRIZE

7.1 The Queensland Conservatorium Griffith University will be responsible for the administration of the prize, including the publicising of the prize and managing funds associated with the prize.
